Proposals to Establish more Specialist School Places for Learners with Emotional Health and Wellbeing Needs

9 FEBRUARY - 26 MARCH 2026



What are the proposed changes about?

Cardiff Council wants to increase the number of specialist places for children and young people aged 4–19 who have Emotional Health and Wellbeing Needs (EHW).

Children and young people with Emotional Health and Wellbeing needs have issues with thinking, feeling and behaving. This impacts on managing how life affects them, how they cope, how they engage with others and the choices they make. This is sometimes as a result of trauma. Children and young people may display anxiety, low self-esteem, school phobia, or behavioural difficulties.

What does the Council want to do?

The Council wants to:

Establish New Specialist Resource Bases (SRBs) at:

- **Baden Powell Primary School** – increase the number of places at the Emotional Health and Wellbeing Needs Specialist Resource Base from 8 to 16 places from January 2027
- **Fairwater Primary School** – increase the number of places at the Emotional Health and Wellbeing Needs Specialist Resource Base from 8 – 16 places from January 2027
- **Ysgol Gymraeg Coed-Y-Gof** – create a new 8 place Emotional Health and Wellbeing Needs Specialist Resource base from January 2027

Increase the number of places in Special Schools

- **Greenhill Special School** – increase the number of places at the school from 64 to 128 places from January 2027. The school would be accommodated across two sites using temporary accommodation at the vacated Court School site in Llanishen.

Why are these changes needed?

- The number of children with Emotional Health and Wellbeing Needs in Cardiff has grown
- There are not enough specialist places in Cardiff schools
- Some children have to go to schools outside Cardiff, which can mean long journeys and cost the Council lots of money
- More local places will help children stay closer to home and be part of their community
- Cardiff wants to make sure all children get the right support, in the right school, at the right time

What is a Specialist Resource Base?

A Specialist Resource Base is:

- A small specialist class in a mainstream school
- Led by trained teachers and staff
- A place where learners can get extra help, while still being part of a mainstream school community
- A safe, supportive space with small groups, higher staffing levels, and access to therapies

What is a Special School?

Special schools:

- Support children with the highest levels of need
- Have small classes and specialist staff
- Provide therapies, sensory rooms, adapted equipment and personalised learning
- Help pupils develop important life and independence skills

Benefits of the proposals

- More children will get the specialist support they need within Cardiff
- Fewer children will have to travel longer distances
- The Council can spend less on expensive independent placements
- It makes use of spare spaces in school buildings
- Families can feel more confident their children are learning in the best place for them

Possible disadvantages

- There could be more school traffic at drop-off and pick up times
- Moving to a new school building can feel worrying for some pupils
- Building work may cause some disruption, but the Council will work to keep this to a minimum

Support for children

All learners in Specialist Resource Bases or special schools have an Individual Development Plan (IDP).

Schools will continue to support all learners with:

- Additional Learning Needs
- English as an Additional Language
- Known to be eligible for Free School Meals
- Minority Ethnic backgrounds

There is no evidence that the proposals will negatively affect these learners.

Travel to school

- The Council will continue to provide free school transport for learners who qualify
- More local places could mean shorter journeys for some children
- All school sites will have safe drop-off and pick up areas

School Staff

- Mainstream schools would have fewer pupils and need fewer staff
- Jobs will be created in the new specialist provision
- There will be opportunities for existing staff to take on new roles
